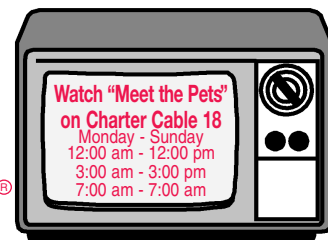

Ask the Vet!

Q: I have a black cat that is about 5 years old. I've noticed recently that she has an increased number of white hairs popping up all over her body. Is this normal? Do cats go "grey" like people do? Is this a sign of some disease? Should I be worried about her?

A: Very likely these are just "grey" hairs similar to what people start seeing as they age. Just like people, the exact age they start appearing can be varied. Some seem to gray very early in their lives and others much later. Besides getting gray, some animals also have thinning hair coats, but rarely go bald unless there is a medical condition. Those that have alopecia or bald areas may have an excess amount of hormones due to a tumor somewhere in the body.

Another cause for white hairs appearing on a cat or dogs body is because of an injury. Some animals show their scars well - like my greyhound. In other animals the fur regrows over a sore and may come back a different color, often a lighter shade or white. This is nothing to worry about. Are you sure that it isn't just white paint?

While we are on the subject of age, I want to remind everyone that cats and dogs do age much faster than us. A five year-old cat is equivalent to 48 in human years. That same age in a small breed dog

is 36 and in a giant breed is 42! As you can see, we no longer just use that easy equation of 1 year equals 7 human years. We are better at understanding that some species age really fast and then slow down, as is the case with cats. The American Veterinary Association has started a campaign to encourage twice yearly examinations on pets. The hope is that we will be able to detect disease or problems sooner and formulate a plan to correct them. As a result we will be able to see our companions living longer and healthier lives. It is not uncommon for me to see cats that are now living to be into their late teens and early 20's. Even if you don't embrace twice yearly exams, I would encourage most owners to at least consider yearly geriatric blood work after their pets reach the age of seven or eight. There are things we can do for disease conditions that we might find with blood work. Recently my parents' cat was found to have some increases in his liver values. He has started supplements, and we will plan on rechecking those values in about 6 months. He looks totally fine on the outside, so this was not something that we hadn't expected, but are glad we found.

Good Luck and I hope all goes well for your cat.

Ask The Trainer



"I'm due to deliver my first child in a few months and I've got both a 3 year old beagle and a 5 year old sheepdog. Is there anything special I need to do to make sure things go smoothly when I bring my baby home?"

Sometimes bringing home a baby can be difficult - not just for the new parents, but also for the other members of the household. Schedules are changed around, everyone is tired, there are new noises and smells... And, for a dog, their house is their whole world, so in a sense, their whole world gets changed! Many times people decide that they cannot keep their dog because they have added a child to their family. But, if you take a few extra steps to ensure things run smoothly, you will find that in most cases everybody can not only live happily together, but have fun with each other!

Before Baby:

1. Teach your dog a "Leave It" command. Right now all of the toys on the floor are his, but when baby comes, there will be toys that he is not supposed to play with. Before your baby is crawling around on the floor, put some baby toys, bottles, blankets on the floor and leave them there. Teach your dog that not everything on the floor is for him. Be sure to redirect him to his toys and praise him when he chooses the right toys to play with.
2. It might sound silly, but hold a baby doll and talk "baby talk" to it. Your dog will wonder what you are doing, and may even be interested in what you are holding and talking to. Be sure to talk calmly and quietly to your dog, praising him if he just sits next to you.
3. Walk your dogs along side the baby stroller. It will be much easier to TEACH them how to do that before the baby is actually IN the stroller!

After Baby's born:

1. Have someone come home after the baby is born and let your dogs smell an article from the child. A baby bonnet or undershirt is best because those

are items that are close to the baby's skin and will smell most like it. When they introduce the article of clothing, have them talk very calmly and quietly. This way your dogs will already know the baby's smell before you come home with the real thing!

2. When you first come home from the hospital your dogs will be very excited to see you! Have someone else watch the new baby for a few minutes so you can spend some time with your dogs. You will have been gone for a few days; you will look different and probably even smell different to them. It is much easier if you walk in the door without the baby, when the initial excitement of you coming home has worn off, then bring in the baby. If you can have someone exercise your dogs, or take them to dog daycare the day that baby comes home, they will be much more relaxed and the process should be nice and smooth.
3. Exercise! Remember to give your dogs enough exercise! A tired dog is a good dog and exercise will do you good also! Getting out of the house and getting fresh air will benefit everybody.
4. When my children were babies I had LOTS of dog treats and chew toys in the house! Every time I would sit down with my baby (and that is a lot!) my dogs would get a rawhide, bone, new toy, stuffed Kong, etc. (You can pre-stuff the Kong's and keep them in the freezer so they are all ready for you when you need them!). My dogs didn't get jealous of the baby, it was the opposite! They couldn't wait for me to sit down with the baby because they knew that meant a yummy treat for them!
5. The dogs will have a natural curiosity to smell the new baby. Don't yell at them, but let them gently sniff the baby for a few second and then calmly tell them that's enough. Remember to redirect them to a toy or bone - Don't just tell them what is wrong, but also let them know what is right.

Following these extra steps on bringing home a new baby should help things run smoothly for everybody in the household! If you feel that your dog has specific issues or problem behaviors, please contact the Dog Den for a private session.

Congratulations to Heidi! Keep up the good work!



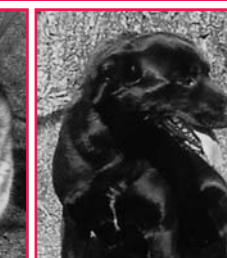
